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
2024 Model Completion Estimates

1/72 Resin Replacement Tracks by OKB-Grigorov:

OKB-Grigorov's tracks offer superior detail to most kit items and, on an initial assessment, would appear to offer close to the convenience of vinyl tracks over sometimes fiddly link & length kit tracks. They also eliminate the risk that vinyl tracks, supplied with some kits, have of dissolving the styrene wheels or falling apart with age. They also often provide patterns, types, or widths not offered by kit tracks, enabling either greater accuracy or alternate versions to be modelled.


However, resin tracks are not always as easy to fit as is often assumed. Generally, the smaller the vehicle, especially its drive-sprockets and idlers, the trickier it can be to fit resin tracks. This is because small radius bends need some application of heat to assist the track in conforming to the track run as, without warming, the track tends to snap.

One method I have used to heat resin tracks is the judicial use of a hairdryer, although it is very easy to misjudge its use and overheat resin tracks with disastrous results. The other is hot water (I limit the heat to one I can tolerate immersing my hand in). Again, if too hot, disaster will result. With either method I try to curl the track around the model's running gear, or a balsa wood form that conforms to the internal dimensions of the track run – Close is good enough as precise fitting is done after forming. Sometimes simple manipulation of the tracks by hand when warmed will suffice. Take care not to bend or crush delicate guide teeth whichever method is used. A bowl of cold water to immerse the heated track in can speed the track's cooling and almost instantly lock in whatever curvature you have caused it to assume.

I have found that resin tracks sometimes will not fit around kit drive sprockets. This is due to small variations in track segment size and pitch. Sometimes, as with the three Cold War tank sets reviewed here, resin drive sprockets matched to the resin track's pitch are included.


OKB-Grigorov's tracks are very good quality and, having bought many of their accessories and kits in the past, I am happy to recommend the tracks reviewed here. They are best ordered with as many other items as you can justify, to spread the fixed postal charge as thinly as you can. Thanks to OKB-Grigorov for the review samples.


S72042 Pz.III/IV 40cm Type 1






S72319 Pz.III/IV Type 8

'REFLECTIONS ON RESEARCH'


The above headline is a 'borrow' from the original editor of our now long defunct IPMS New Zealand/Auckland magazine 'Scale Dimensions', Paul Tibbutt.

This article came about when I was trying to decide on a subject for our upcoming Black/White group build, and hopefully something reasonably simple and straightforward and to hopefully regain my dormant modelling mojo back!

I had decided to build the A6M3 Type 22 (Zero) that was brought back to New Zealand after the war, and now resides in the Auckland War Memorial Museum. For more on this see my website page at:

I was going to do it in the 'surrender' scheme of overall white with green crosses as found by the RNZAF when they learned of its presence on southern Bougainville, so dug back through my files for photos I have saved of it in this scheme. Looking at some of the high resolution photos I'd saved from the Air Force Museum Of New Zealand site showed up something I had never noticed before, or had seen any comments about...the cockpit canopy had only been painted white on the port side, and the starboard side remained in the original dark green!






Hmm....double checked, and it's the same in all photos of this aircraft taken on Bougainville.

The next item to sort out was the colours of the oddly done anti-glare panel colours on the cowling. Once again, a close look at one of the museum's photos shows that this appears to be two different colours, and I have deduced that the engine cowling would have still been in the standard blue-black as originally painted at the factory, and behind that and the starboard canopy side in the standard IJN dark green.



I was lucky to find that I did actually have the correct 1:48 scale model in my stash (the Hasegawa kit JT110), and as a bonus, included in the box was the KMC A6M3 (type 22) update set 48-4002! Lots of lovely resin and PE cockpit upgrades, resin and PE folding wingtips and a couple of other items such as PE cowl flaps and resin ailerons and flaps. I have got into the habit of purchasing such items when they are first released, one never knows whether they will be in production for long, or how long before they become the proverbial 'chickens lips/rocking horse sh*t).



It's still going to take a bit of work as it will firstly require finishing in the original 'factory' scheme, then roughly whitewashed with the green crosses. Should exercise all of my latent skills eh-what!

1/35 Resin Drive sprockets for Early T-34's by OKB-Grigorov

OKB Grigorov has an excellent reputation in the 1/72nd scale upgrade space, and I did not realize that they had some upgrades available in my preferred 1/35th scale. When the club received some OKB products for review recently they included a couple of sets of replacement sprockets for a 1/35th scale T-34 and I picked those up for this review. The sets are S35004 – Sprocket wheel for T-34 Model 1940 Type 1 and S35004 – Sprocket wheel for T-34 Model 1940 Type 3.






The T-34 had innumerable detail changes throughout its long production, including many variations in the running gear. Some variations were aimed at simplification while others resulted from material shortages and some just because the different factories producing the tank got subcomponents from different sources. I don't pretend to be an expert on all these differences but do have a general familiarity with the T-34. Both sets I have may be candidates for use on Dragon's T-34 model 1949 and 1940 kits. It's great if you can match the parts combination up with a real example.

Both sets contained 2 complete sets of drive sprockets which are comprised of separate inner and outer wheels. The individual parts come on a surrounding carrier with 'sprue like' connection points. The carrier can be removed without tools just by pressing them away from the connection points. The running surface of the wheels can be easily cleaned up with files or a sanding stick after that. The resin used is hard without being too brittle and allows for extremely fine details to be rendered cleanly. The castle nuts on the type 3 wheels have sharp detail. The wheels mate perfectly once you have found the sweet spot by rotating the parts until they click together.

T-34 Model 1940 Type 1






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The details look very sharp when compared with those supplied in Dragon's T-34 1939/40 running gear sprue and I can recommend these to anyone building an early T-34. The idea of including 2 sets of sprockets may appeal to someone assembling a collection of T-34's but most of us would be just as happy with single set, especially if that reduced the purchase price. The price from the OKB web site is €10.00 per set which combined with shipping may be a little on the high side for some.
